Thank you for your e-mail concerning your Model Year (MY) 2003 Toyota Camry. Your e-mail was received by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) Office of Defects Investigation on February 28, 2007. We regret any inconvenience our delay in responding may have caused you.

We appreciate the report you provided. NHTSA has received a Defect Petition (DP06-003, resume enclosed), which may be of interest to you regarding an engine surging problem. NHTSA is continuing to review this alleged problem; however, no determinations have been reached at this time. We understand the dealership could not duplicate the surging problem you experienced while your brake was applied, and it is one time occurrence. However, the information you provided has been entered into our database.
