Thank you for your correspondence dated December 4, 2007, concerning your model year (MY) 1994 Lincoln Town Car. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) Office of Defects Investigation received your correspondence on January 9, 2008.

NHTSA is the Federal agency responsible for improving safety on our Nation's highways. We are authorized to order manufacturers to recall and repair vehicles or items of motor vehicle equipment when our investigations indicate that they contain serious safety defects in their design, construction, or performance. We also monitor the adequacy of manufacturers' recall campaigns.

We appreciate the report you provided. Reports from motorists are a very important source of information for us. We regret any problems you may be experiencing with your vehicle. The interim remedy for NHTSA safety recall 07V-336 is to disconnect the speed control switch. This will mitigate the safety aspect of the defect and will complete the recall campaign. Owners who receive the interim remedy will be notified by Ford Motor Company when the fused wiring harnesses are available. As a customer satisfaction campaign, Ford Motor Company will then reconnect the speed control system at no cost to vehicle owners. We contacted Ford on your behalf. We were assured that the parts are being manufactured as quickly as possible; however no specific timeline was given.
