Thank you for your correspondence concerning your model year (MY) 2003 Acura RSX. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) Office of Defects Investigation received your correspondence. We regret any inconvenience our delay in responding may have caused you.

NHTSA is the Federal agency responsible for improving safety on our Nation's highways. We are authorized to order manufacturers to recall and repair vehicles or motor vehicle equipment when our investigations indicate that they contain safety defects in their design, construction, or performance. We also monitor the completion rates and adequacy of manufacturers' recall campaigns.

You can rest assured that your Acura RSX is not now, and is not scheduled to be, affected by the Takata air bag recalls. In an Order issued to Takata in May of 2016, airbags in all vehicles MY 2008 and older were recalled no later than December 31, 2016. Further, NHTSA has published a list of all vehicles that are currently recalled, or currently scheduled for future recall, in the Takata air bag recalls, including the Priority Group for each vehicle (<https://www.nhtsa.gov/equipment/takata-recall-spotlight>).

If you have concerns regarding the supplier of the air bags in your vehicle, we recommend that you continue contacting Honda for that information. NHTSA does not, as a matter of course, collect or maintain comprehensive information about components (such as air bags) that are installed in manufacturer's vehicles. Accordingly, Honda is the best source for the information you seek.

To stay up to date on all vehicle safety recalls, we recommend that you visit NHTSA's website at least twice per year, where you can search using your Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) in the VIN Look-Up Tool. As a courtesy, we entered your vehicle identification number (VIN) into our VIN Look-Up tool, which searches for open recalls through a direct link to the manufacturers' database. Our enclosed report confirms that there are no open recalls on your vehicle.

Should you encounter a safety-related problem with a motor vehicle or motor vehicle equipment in the future, we would appreciate it if you would complete an electronic Vehicle Owner's Questionnaire online at www.nhtsa.gov or call the Auto Safety Hotline at 888-327-4236.
