Thank you for the letter about your model year (MY) 2017 Chevrolet Traverse vehicle. Your letter was forwarded to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) Office of Defects Investigation. I am pleased to respond.

NHTSA is the Federal agency responsible for improving safety on our Nation's roadways. We are authorized to order manufacturers to recall and repair vehicles or motor vehicle equipment when our investigations indicate that they contain safety defects, such as in their design, construction, or performance. Among other activities, we also monitor the completion rates and adequacy of manufacturers' recall campaigns.

We appreciate the report you provided. Reports from motorists are a very important source of information for us. Please extend our sincere sympathy to your neighbor for their injuries. We reviewed our database to identify whether a safety defect trend exists with a sudden loss of brakes followed by unintended acceleration in MY 2017 Chevrolet Traverse vehicles. At this time, NHTSA has not identified sufficient evidence to open a safety defect investigation or to initiate a recall. However, we entered your information into NHTSA's database, where it will be used with other reports to identify any safety defect trends that may require our attention. A number of factors, other than crash severity, can affect whether an air bag will deploy in a specific crash, e.g., the angle of impact, the speed of the involved vehicles, and the amount of force absorbed by vehicles or objects that are impacted. When provided with all necessary details and particularly after an opportunity to examine the vehicle(s) involved in a crash, an expert in crash reconstruction can provide an educated opinion as to whether the air bag in a vehicle should have deployed in a specific crash. If you have not done so already, we strongly encourage you to report this incident to General Motors as soon as possible.
