Symptom/Vehicle Issue: Customer complaint includes a Mil-on condition. Upon further investigation, one or more of the following fault codes may be set in the PCM:

- P0456 EVAP System Small Leak
- P0455 EVAP System Large Leak
- P04EC EVAP System Large Leak Fuel Tank Side (PHEV only)
- P04EE EVAP System Very Small Leak Fuel Tank Side (PHEV only)
- P0441 EVAP Purge Flow Performance
- P1CEA Boost Side EVAP Purge System Performance

Discussion: Perform the appropriate Wi-Tech EVAP Leak Test.

Note: EVAP test procedure will vary depending on whether it is a conventional or PHEV system

If a leak is detected after testing, then check for proper connection of the recirculation lines in the midpoint quick-connect as shown in Fig. 1 or 2. If the quick connect is loose, then properly reconnect the lines and run the Wi-Tech EVAP Leak Test again to confirm that leakage is no longer present.
